Cagers are 'guinea pigs' for pro 24-second rule

The Farmington - Plymouth basketball teams were used as guinea pigs last Friday in their game at Plymouth. The two teams copied the 24-second rule used by the professionals.

Under the rule, the team with the ball, any time during the game, has to get off a shot within 24 seconds. If the team fails to take a shot within the prescribed limit, it loses the ball on a violation. If a team shoots and the ball hits the rim or backboard, and the same team amkes a successful rebound, the 24-second clock starts over again.

The rule is generally successful in preventing a team from stalling and it usually helps speed up the game. The National Basketball Association credits the rule with revolutionizing the pro game since it was installed over 10 years ago.

Plymouth High Athletic Director John Sandmann arranged with the Detroit Pistons to lend him the special set of the 24-second time clocks for the game.

Many coaches and athletic directors, as well as fans, often argue over this controversial rule. Those against point out that it lessens the chance of an upset by eliminating the stall and by speeding up the game.
